This easy-to-use eLearning module is one of the courses from an extensive EU eLearning programme on Customs and Taxation.


The course is a short introduction to the concept of BPM (**Business Process Modelling**) and its use in the Customs field.

Business Process Modelling is the activity of representing processes, so that the current process may be correctly understood, analysed and improved. BPM helps to represent the process in an universal way independent from the language as it is mainly using graphical tools. The purpose of BPM is to illustrate a complete business process and obtain a simplified and streamlined process.



Benefits of BPM to Customs

- BPM can illustrate a common understanding of processes executed by customs authority and provide basis for meaningful discussion and collaboration at EU level.
- BPM can improve measurement of results and make them easier to compare at EU level.
- BPM can reveal and describe inter-dependencies and interconnections within and between processes at EU level.
- BPM can provide a common language and ease exchange of information, experiences, and best practices.
- BPM can help identify the areas where working methods can and should be further harmonised, streamlined and standardised.
- Well-timed BPM of Customs processes can help to identify and support planning of legislative, IT, training and other requirements in the right sequence.
